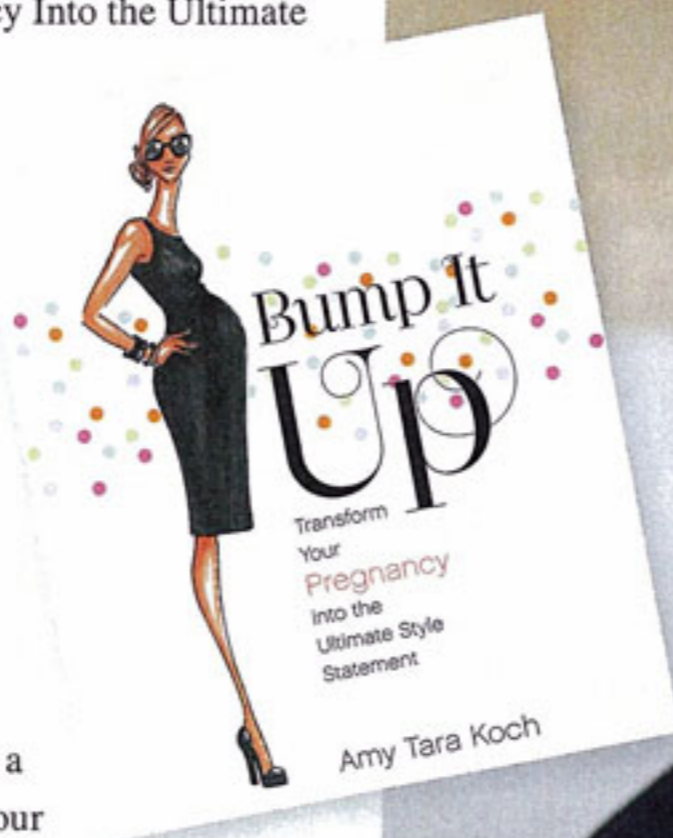
An author's guide to looking chic throughout pregnancy.

When fashion reporter Amy Koch got pregnant with her first baby, she immediately started covering up with sweat pants and sweatshirts; until, that is, she had a revelation. "I couldn't let my professional credibility be eradicated by leisure-wear," she says. "I had to step up to the fashion plate—even when I felt the breakfast rising in my throat—and not give in to looking dumpy." Koch then took the editorial concepts that she wrote about pre-pregnancy and fine-tuned them to create a long, lean silhouette of her now pregnant body. "It's about approaching fashion formulaically," she explains. And after she had created that perfect pregnancy fashion formula, Koch knew she had to share it. The result is Koch's new book, "Bump It Up: Transform Your Pregnancy Into the Ultimate Style Statement."

The book is a fun, yet super informative guide to all things pregnancy style. There's even a section on beauty and how to create a "faux glow" if your pregnancy isn't naturally producing the oft-spoken-of luminosity. Some of her pointers include not wearing oversized garments, always wearing heels (just giving up the ultra spikes for a more stable wedge), and always showing your décolletage—a place where you don't gain baby weight.

But Koch's formula is not about spending a fortune on clothes you can wear only during your pregnancy. She believes in buying select "fertility fashion" basics and then "bumping up" the style with layering and "super accessorizing." "The goal is to embrace and enhance your pregnancy body," Koch says. "I love all the hot celebrity moms who have drawn attention to being pregnant recently. It has given us the ability to be more dramatic and have fun with our pregnancies." Koch says the important thing to remember is that celeb moms "are not miracles of nature! They've just figured out the correct silhouettes for their pregnant bodies." In addition to her own tips and guidance, Koch's book also has sketches from famous fashion designers such as Diane von Furstenberg, Kate Spade, Nanette Lepore and Nicole Miller of their favorite maternity looks and why they work so well. "They've all had babies, and they all had their own pregnancy style for their particular body types," Koch says of the designers.

At the end of the day, every pregnant woman has a different body type, a different pre-existing wardrobe and a different lifestyle, but the desire to look stylish throughout her nine months of pregnancy is a strong unifying factor. Koch's ultimate advice? Creativity is key. The cherry on top is that Koch's tips work for non-pregnant women, too! "Once you have that formula for dressing, it lasts for a lifetime," Koch says. "You know about proportion and what looks good, and it makes getting dressed so much easier! Putting together a look is like a painting. You have a primary shape, and then you add color and texture to it to make it a masterpiece."
